POLYTECHNIC LIBRARY'S ANNUAL DONATE-A-BOOK PROJECT

The Donate-a-Book project was initiated by the Polytechnic Library in 2011, with the purpose to assist smaller rural libraries in need of books. In addition to this, the Library hoped to encourage reading among Namibians by reaching out to communities in this way.

The Polytechnic staff and students are invited each year in September to donate books they no longer need or to purchase and donate books to an under-resourced Namibian library. Libraries that have received donations from this project are Omuthiya, Katima Mulilo, Mariental and Nkrurenkuru Community Libraries. The recipient library for 2015 is the Grootfontein Public Library. Organisers selected September–October for the project so as to encompass World Literacy Day which falls within the second week of September each year.

This year, for the first time, the Library is working with the Namibian Book Fair. We are very excited about this cooperative venture and we ask our kind

donors to please help us to spread the word about the beauty of Namibian literature! You can do this by purchasing the Namibian books that will be on display outside the Library, and by donating these to the Polytechnic Library and/or to Grootfontein Public Library. We will have boxes for these donations in front of the Library. Please help us to make the Donate-a-book and Namibian Book Fair events of 2015 a resounding success!

Helvi Wheeler Founder

Helvi is an award-winning author of children's books, and Founder of Yambeka Children Media (YCM) a community Social Enterprise created to promote African languages, tales and the culture of reading. Helvi completed her Bachelor's Degree in Information Technology at Wilberforce University in Ohio, and a Master's Degree in Education at the University of Illinois.

As a young mother Helvi struggled to find toddler's books written in Oshiwambo or containing the tales she grew up with. Unable to find anything that was appealing to young children, she decided to develop her own range of colorful reads reflecting her cultural heritage. Since then she has written books targeting children of 0 – 13 years in English, Oshiwambo and Swahili, and looks forwards to having them translated into as many African languages as possible.

To date she has published more than eight children books. Helvi has attended and exhibited at international book fairs in Cape Town, Nairobi, and the world biggest book fair in Frankfurt.

Helvi believes that the backbone of a nation is history which is completely absorbed.



Nashilongo Amutenya Editor

Nashilongo has been with the Namibia Book Fair since its inception in 2012. Whilst coming from an Industrial Psychology, Human Resource academic background, she has always been an all 'round crafts and recreations enthusiast.

Nashilongo believes in the youth and their potential and hence has always taken the opportunities to mentor, for example as an educator for a short period but also on encounters with the youth of her community.

A keen visual artist, she has illustrated for publishing houses, for children's publications and has more creative works in the pipeline. Although she loves the outdoors the most, when indoors, she takes time to appreciate some of the other things in which she takes pleasure, such as literature.

Luise Mwanyanya Marketing



COMIC BOOK

Mitchell Gatsi, as the comic book workshop facilitator, will be equipping aspiring artists with an in-depth guide to charting and creating a successful illustrated story.

Mitchell Gatsi, is an upcoming illustrator, and visual artist. Since he was a little boy, he has taken drawing as an everyday activity with inspiration from other artists that he would find in art magazines, from comic books and envisioned one day to venture into any kind of work that requires drawing skills. He studied visual arts at the College of the Arts and Crafts (Katutura) and now he's a Namibian Visual Arts and Craft graduate. During his time at the college he got involved in few comic workshop and the one that stands out from the rest was the Speech Bubble workshop that was held during the first Namibia Book Fair in 2012. After his three years at the college he decided to become a freelance artist in the line of comic illustrating and today he illustrates stories for public and private writers.

In my own words I describe works of illustrations as a tool that drive words to create the story into visual images which helps the reader to better understand the actions and emotions within the story.

POETRY WRITING

The workshop is aimed for high school learners and young adults (15–24, although older adults are also welcome). It will cover the basics of writing a poem, and will specifically look at: the poem as a sequence of events, using metaphor and imagery in your poem, and the basics of performing/ reciting a poem for an audience.

Hugh Ellis has been writing poetry since his first year at university in **1997**. He has performed at Spoken Word and in **2012** published a collection of poetry called *Hakahana* (published by Wordweaver Publishing House). He was born in Windhoek in **1978**, but grew up the UK, before returning to Namibia with his parents in **1990**. In his 'day job' he teaches photography, journalistic writing and media design in the Bachelor of Journalism and Media Technology programme at the Polytechnic of Namibia. He has been at the Polytechnic since **2010**, and before that gained experience as a journalist (**2001–7**) and a UN communication officer (**2008–9**). He has an MA degree in Journalism from Rhodes University and is a part-time PhD candidate in the Wits Department of Media Studies. THE EXPERIENCE OF WRITING A BOOK AS A DIASPORA LIBRARIAN WORKING AND LIVING IN NAMIBIA

In this presentation we get an insight into what inspired Tonderayi Chanakira who is a librarian by profession to write his first book entitled: "Tonderayi's Way. 
